A changing community

In 1967, we opened the doors to our Niverville Centennial Arena. It was an ambitious project for its time as the community was much smaller and less unified than it is today. Project volunteers and community leaders worked tirelessly and eventually completed the rink, even though they needed to use rafters from an old grocery store (before recycling was fashionable).

The rink is still in use today, booked to capacity, but expensive to run and maintain. "It's old and cold," it's been said.

In 1995, town leaders initiated a conversation about building a new community facility for Niverville. There were many people who supported the project, but there were opponents, too. The project did not proceed.

But just a couple of years later, in 1997, the community started to change. First, people worked diligently sideby-side to fight the Flood of the Century. Then, we rallied together to support a memorial to honour Niverville's pioneers, war veterans, and conscientious objectors alike. It was a pivotal time in the life of our community. Tears were shed. Hearts were opened. We became one.

Since then, we have attracted more residents, including many young families. Businesses and the real estate market flourished. With this growth, though, it became clear that our beloved facilities were no longer adequate. The arena was aging; and the Niverville Heritage Centre, which still hosts many community events, was starting to burst at the



seams whenever the community gathered for graduations and Remembrance Day ceremonies.

In 2015, as in 1995, town leaders and community advocates gathered again as a think tank to consider possible solutions to Niverville's evolving facilities challenges. This time, there was an unbridled enthusiasm to proceed. The dream of the Community Resource and Recreation Centre was born.

Focus groups were formed. Meetings were convened. Galas were held. People rolled up their sleeves and the dream took shape.

So, here we are, on the brink of another glorious turning point in our community's story. We have raised almost 90% of the dollars we need to proceed.

This is a tremendous opportunity to enhance and enrich Niverville and to build an even greater community for our children and grandchildren. This is our home. This is our time.
